Say what you have to say, what you have a will to say, in the simplest, the most direct and exact manner possible, with no surplusage:there, is the justification of the sentence so fortunately born, "entire, smooth, and round", that it needs no punctuation, and also (that is the point!) of the most elaborate period, if it be right in its elaboration. Here is the office of ornament: here also the purpose of restraint in ornament.
